# **GRAESER FAMILY EDUCATION CENTER**

If gardening is a family affair, then Emil and Nancy Graeser are Louisville's leading proponents. Their family – five children and nine grandchildren – is already a part of the Waterfront Botanical Gardens, with sizable donations and bricks bought in their honor. Their 11 great-grandchildren will surely benefit when the new Education Pavilion is named in the Graeser family's honor, with groundbreaking scheduled for September 15.

Emil and Nancy have donated \$650,000 to the garden, and pledged another \$1,000,000 as a matching grant. All five of their children have donated money to help create an educational facility that their grandchildren – ranging from 8 months to the eighth grade – can enjoy.

Emil's love for gardens started as a child when he became interested in bonsai plants. He is excited about the Waterfront Botanical Gardens' Japanese garden and bonsai display, to be completed in a future phase.

"Mostly," he said, "we are willing to give to help generate more funds for the rest of the garden. All of our children have contributed in some way so that there will be a botanical garden in Louisville for our great-grandchildren."

#### Main Room - \$500,000

This will be the main room of the building, estimated at 2,500 square feet, with the ability to hold multiple school groups or 250 guests at an event.

## Education Plaza - \$500,000

The plaza around the Education Pavilion and Gardens will allow for easy access to the individual gardens, fountains and buildings. The plaza will be designed for accessibility for all guests regardless of age, size, ability or limitations.

#### Conference Room - \$250,000

This smaller room of 1,500 square feet will be used for smaller meetings by staff, local businesses and garden groups.

## Covered Patio/Terrace - \$250,000

The Education Pavilion will be designed with an outer, covered deck that will have a view of the Education Gardens and the Woodland Garden.

# Ramp to Pavilion - \$100,000

The ramp is an important part of the learning environment, providing easy access to all visitors as they travel among the interior learning space to the outdoor classrooms and garden space.

## **Vestibule/Entrance - \$100,000**

The entrance to the Education Pavilion will be a welcoming space to bring guests into the flexible, creative learning environment of the building.

## Pathway to Beargrass Creek - \$100,000

The pathway to Beargrass Creek links visitors from the Education Pavilion with easy access through the Woodland.

# Education 100 - \$10,000

The Education 100 is a group of 100 donors who have committed \$10,000 each to support the completion of the Education Pavilion. Those 100 donors will be permanently recognized in the building through an artistic installation.

# **FUNDRAISING FOR PHASE 1**

As we move toward the groundbreaking of the Education Pavilion, we continue our fundraising efforts. Help us raise \$1.9 million to complete the design, preparation and construction of the **Graeser Family Education Center**. This beautiful education facility will open in the first half of 2019 and welcome school students as well as the community for all types of events.

# Phases of the site

Since we unveiled our Master Plan in November 2014, we knew this day would come. We are excited to announce that site work will begin in the next few months. In fact, you may have already noticed some clearing on the site.

- // Clearing has begun. Honeysuckle and invasive clearing will continue, making the way for new plantings.
- // "Earthworks" refers to the movement of dirt, which will include the entrance area on Frankfort Avenue, the access road to the Education Pavilion and the area around the building. Earthworks will begin in summer.
- // In the middle of all that movement on the site, our Horticulture Committee will be working to develop the large **Pollinator Meadow.**
- // All of the site prep is to make way for **utilities installation**, which will begin in January 2018.
- // After the installation of the utilities will be the **paving of the** road, allowing access to begin construction of the building.
- // Building construction is scheduled to begin in spring 2018.

If we are able to stay on schedule with construction and fundraising, we will be able to celebrate in the building in early 2019.



# THE FIELDS ARE ALIVE WITH THE SOUND OF POLLINATORS

# INTRODUCING THE FIRST GARDENS OF THE WATERFRONT BOTANICAL GARDENS

Scenic fields of wildflowers have taken center stage in Hollywood films, from the crimson poppy fields in *The Wizard of Oz* to the yellow flower-crowned hills on which Julie Andrews danced and sang the title song in The Sound of Music. Fields of colorful flowers and waving grasses not only are picturesque, but they provide many benefits.

Waterfront Botanical Gardens is pleased to announce plans to feature a 7-acre wildflower meadow and approximately 2 acres of grasslands that will cover a portion of the site from the Frankfort Avenue entrance and along the southern portion toward the site of the future Educational Pavilion. The planning and planting of the wildflower meadow will begin next spring.

The majority of the plants for the 9-acre project will have been "born and raised" in Kentucky, and are considered natives. Native plants lived here long before humans ever discovered the rolling hills and delicious waters of Kentucky. Planting native plants is beneficial because they require less water and maintenance, because they have adapted to our soils and the rapidly changing climate.

Some of the wildflowers that may steal the show are Black-Eyed Susan, Pale Purple Coneflower, Blazing Star, Butterflyweed, Swamp Milkweed, Cardinal Flower, Anise Hyssop, Partridge Pea, New England Aster, Tickseed, Purple Prairie Clover, Foxglove Beardtongue, Slender Mountain Mint, Wild Senna and Goldenrods. The grasslands will credit Little Bluestem, Dropseed Prairie Grass and other beauties.

As many gardeners know, there is an adage about perennial plants: "The first year, they sleep; the second year, they creep; and the third year, they leap." That will apply to many of the

species planted in the project area. Some may flower in the first year, but much of the work will happen offstage or underground - in this case, as they grow their roots bigger and stronger. Trust me, it takes patience to reap the rewards of having sown a meadow and grassland. Then, by the third year, your wildflowers and grasses will burst into full splendor.

Once the 9-acre garden area begins to flourish, visitors will take pleasure in the appearances and songs of ruby-throated hummingbirds, Eastern bluebirds, Eastern meadowlarks, and American goldfinches, among others. The wildflowers and grasses will provide nectar, food and shelter for birds and native pollinators that are experiencing a decline, such as butterflies, bees and other pollinating insects. Some of the plants, such as milkweed, are host plants for Monarch butterflies.

# I am pleased to see and support the development of this the Pollinator Meadow, which urban agritourism in will be the first garden of the the Louisville area.

Kentucky Agriculture Commissioner Ryan Quarles has expressed great interest in Waterfront Botanical Gardens. "I am pleased to see and support

the development of this urban agritourism in the Louisville area," Commissioner Quarles said. He also stressed the importance of pollinators to the balance of our ecosystem.
