



To develop an urban botanical garden by transforming a landfill and creating a place where nature prospers and people thrive through education, entertainment, community, and tourism.

History

Waterfront Botanical Gardens was started by Botanica, an umbrella organization for the local gardening community started in 1993. In 2001, a bequest from member Helen Harrigan led to the creation of Waterfront Botanical Gardens. The Gardens' site was selected in 2009, the Master Plan was created in 2014, and the Gardens opened to the public in 2019 with the completion of the Graeser Family Education Center. In 2021, the Ellen T. Leslie Botanical Classrooms were built as the educational hub for Adult and Youth Education programs. As of 2024, Waterfront Botanical Gardens has completed Phase 1 of a 4-Phase Master Plan. Phase 2 construction will begin in 2025.





About the Gardens

Waterfront Botanical Gardens is located just beyond downtown Louisville and welcomes over 57,000 visitors annually. As an urban botanical garden, WBG gives the metro region a necessary green space for recreation and relaxation. The Gardens' special events and programs promote cultural exchange, community connection, and highlight the importance of nature.

Current Phase: 2A

The planned focus of Phase 2A is the development of the Graeser Family Bonsai Garden, Tree Allée, and Beargrass Creek Overlook. Our Bonsai Garden will house our ever-growing collection of over 40 bonsai trees, and allow space for them to be cared for and curated, as well as stored for dormancy.



A Tree Allée of 24 American Dream Swamp® White Oak trees will lead to the Overlook which has a beautiful view of Beargrass Creek.
